Discussion was held regarding the Livestock Friendly Designation presentation. Kenny Reinke and Ed Pellatz from Antelope County Ag Society were in attendance of discussion. As per the email they were agreeable to include the presentation in the Antelope County Fair activities this year, on Saturday, August 6, 2016 at approximately 4:00 PM before the annual BBQ in conjunction with the tractor parade. All were in agreement and a motion was made by Supervisor Williby, seconded by Supervisor Kerkman to have the Ag Society coordinate with Steve Martin of Nebraska Ag Department for the presentation time. Voting aye: Williby, Kerkman, Schindler, Koinzan, Henery, Bolling and Schwager. Nays none. Motion carried. Liz Doerr, Antelope County Zoning Administrator gave a brief synopsis of office activities. There is a Planning Commission meeting scheduled for Tuesday, June 21, 2016 at 1:00 PM. The agenda includes many items including: Public Hearing for Black Strap, Beef Feedlot Increase by Matt Klabenes. Also up for discussion are the airport hazard overlay, and the request from Mark Hunzeker, Attorney, for Protect Antelope County Future for change of zoning regulations. Liz stated the zoning regulations are still being reworked and revamped by the consultant, and they would take the recommendations submitted by Mr. Hunzeker under advisement during this revamping process.

Liz also discussed a moratorium on Wind Tower conditional use permit application, until such time the zoning regulations are updated and completed. In her discussions with Joe Abler, Antelope County Attorney, and the Planning Consultant, Keith Marvin, all thought this idea might be worth exploring. Mr. Marvin has been and is in contact with Dave Ptak, attorney regarding the current regulations and the new regulations that might be in the makings. Motion was made by Supervisor Henery to place a six (6) month moratorium on accepting CUP on wind turbine farms. Motion was seconded by Supervisor Schindler. After discussion and the fact that the current Upstream project may need to have zoning application updates to relocate towers that are in the airport approach zone if this affects that. At this time the board does not want to interfere with current project actions. Voting aye: none. Voting nay: Henery, Schindler, Williby, Koinzan, Bolling and Schwager. Kerkman abstained. Motion did not carry. LIz asked the supervisors to give it some thought and discuss it. Depending how today's interest; she will research and work on moratorium language and ideas from Mr. Marvin and Dave Ptak. Discussion with Joe Abler, County Attorney continued regarding moratorium and any legal input. It was discussed the current Upstream application has been accepted so changes that are made would be considered amendments, not new application, so it should not affect the current project. Attorney Abler reminded the board to act as a board, and to not act to eliminate an application and to be done reasonably and not arbitrarily and they could not change midstream. Supervisor Koinzan made a motion by have County Attorney Joe Abler draw up a resolution on a Moratorium on new wind tower CUP application for six months, while the Planning and Zoning is working through the review and update of the regulations, or until zoning regulations are approved and in place, Supervisor Henery seconded motion. Voting aye: Koinzan, Henery, Williby, Schindler, Bolling and Schwager. Nays none. Motion carried. Kerkman abstained.

The Upstream resolution was to be signed. Since the June 7, 2016 meeting Mike Degan, attorney for Invenergy Wind LLC, has been in contact with the county attorney regarding language used in condition number 20 on the resolution of Invenergy's conditional use permit. Condition number 20 dealt with the GE recommended setbacks regarding ice slinging. Discussion involved various tax payers, Invenergy Attorney, Emily Kobylarczyk, Business Developer from Invenergy, all seven supervisors, Liz Doerr, and County Attorney Joe Abler. It was stated by taxpayers the resolution was completed during the public hearing and it could not by changed just because we wanted to change it. County Attorney Abler stated the public hearing was closed at the time of the resolution discussion, and clarification is not the changing of the resolution. A lengthy discussion was held on the actual statement by Mr. Marvin and the true intentions of the board. A motion was made by Supervisor Williby, seconded by Supervisor Henery to amend the 20th condition on the approved resolution 2016-06-0005 to read as follows: "Upstream Energy shall comply with the GE manufacturer's recommended setbacks as stated in attached Exhibit A or the current applicable setbacks stated in Antelope County Zoning Regulations Section 1504.05, or whichever is greater. Upstream shall submit and identify any tower that cannot meet said setbacks and provide mitigation of ice shedding by shutdown." Voting aye: Henery, Schindler, Williby, Koinzan, Bolling and Schwager. Kerkman abstained. Nays: none. Motion carried. Resolution was signed. Motion was made by Supervisor Henery, seconded by Supervisor Schindler to have Jerry sign Upstream resolution. WHEREAS, the public hearing has been held pursuant to said notice and all statements received at the hearing have been duly considered by the Planning Commission;

WHEREAS the Antelope County Planning Commission has reviewed the application and make recommendation to the Antelope County Board of Supervisors for approval with conditions;

AND WHEREAS the Antelope County Board of Supervisors has given public notice as required by the Nebraska State Statutes, of a hearing held on the 24th day of May, 2016, at the American Legion hall in Neligh, Nebraska;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ANTELOPE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, THAT THE UPSTREAM WIND ENERGY LLC CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT BE APPROVED WITH THE FOLLOWING CONDITIONS:

1. Prior to erection of any individual tower/wind turbine, Upstream shall provide the Antelope County Zoning Administrator (the "Zoning Administrator) a Determination of No Hazard issued by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for each individual Tower/Wind Turbine at its final turbine location. In addition, the Project will work with the County, including through its planning consultant Marvin Consultants, and the Nebraska Department of Aeronautics to ensure the Project complies with any standard or requirements for height structures as they may apply to any Project Tower/Wind Turbines proposed to be located within the flight instrument approach zone and the 3 mile turning zone, as contemplated by Section 3-301(5) (a) (i) of the Nebraska Airport Zoning Act. To the extent any of Tower/Wind Turbines does not comply with requirements set for the by the FAA or the Nebraska Airport Zoning Act, such Tower/Wind Turbine will not be constructed and will not be considered part of this proposed Wind Energy Conversion System.

2. Prior to commencement of construction of any individual Tower/Wind Turbine, Upstream shall provide exact final global positioning system locations to the Zoning Administrator, the Antelope County Planning Commission and the County Assessor per Assessor's requirements for each Tower/Turbine.

3. Upstream shall be allowed to cross or run parallel to any County Roads within the Project Area utilizing the Road Right-of-Way wherever necessary for the Project's ancillary facilities, including aerial construction or burial of components of the electrical collection and fiber-optic system (including overhang or line-sway of aerial lines located on adjacent private property), provided such crossing or use of Road Right-of-way shall be in compliance with Antelope County's Criteria for Permit to use Road Right-of-Way dated May 11, 1998. Except where necessary, equipment used for Project construction will be located outside of the County Road Right-of-Way so as not to present a public safety hazard. Where it is necessary for equipment to be located within the County Road Right-of-Way, it will only be for such minimal period of time as necessary, and the Project will remove such equipment and materials from the Road Right-of-Way as soon as the work within the Road Right-of-Way is complete.

4. This Conditional Use Permit applies only to the 168 Towers/Wind Turbines and other associated facilities witch make up this Wind Energy Conversion System (including any Transmission Lines), at the specific locations for the proposed Tower/Wind Turbines in Exhibit C of this Application. Each Tower/Wind Turbine will be allowed to be located within 600 feet in any direction from the specific proposed location in Exhibit C to accommodate for physical surface and subsurface site conditions, landowner concerns, etc. after demonstrating that it will meet the appropriate setbacks. To the extent the Project needs to build any Tower/Wind Turbine as part of this Wind Energy Conversion System that is outside the 600 feet from any specific proposed Tower/Wind Turbine location set forth in Exhibit C, the Project will be required to seek separate authorization from the County in the form of a permit amendment for that Tower(s)/Wind Turbine(s), by following the notice requirements of Article 10 of the County's zoning regulations, as applicable.
5. Within 60 calendar days of completing construction of any phase of the Wind Energy Conversion System, the Project will provide the Zoning Administrator a final Project site layout, which will demonstrate that each Tower/Wind Turbine is located within 600 feet of the specific location for that Tower/Wind Turbine as set forth in Exhibit C. All turbines directed to be lit according to FAA rules and regulations and shall be indicated on the site layout.

6. Within 24 months of completion of any initial phase of the Wind Energy Conversion System, the Project will be required to perform a noise analysis demonstrating the Project is in compliance with Section 1504.06 (11) of the County's zoning regulations.
7. The applicant shall acquire environmental permits prior to construction. Copies of said environmental permits shall be given to the Zoning Administrator pre-construction.

8. It is specifically contemplated that the 168 Towers/Wind Turbines or 350 MW of generation and associated facilities which make up this Wind Energy Conversion System may be constructed and placed in service in phases, to accommodate necessary Project financing, obtaining any required power purchase agreements, and other business reasons. Consistent with Condition 4 above, however, to the extent Applicant (or any other party) wishes to construct Towers/Wind Turbines other than those proposed in this Application, even if such other Towers/ Wind turbines are combined with one or more of the Tower/Wind Turbines proposed in this Application, a new Conditional Use Permit will be required for the additional Towers/Wind Turbines (and associated facilities) beyond the approved 168 Towers/Wind Turbines or amended turbine per condition 4 above.

9. To the extent any non-participating landowner within the Project Area intends to build a new dwelling unit (ie residence) within the 2000 foot reciprocal setback required by Section 1504.04 of the zoning regulations, the Project agrees not to object to the landowner obtaining from the County the required waiver of such setback. To the extent that such dwelling unit is built within the reciprocal setback, the Project will be deemed in compliance with the Commercial/Utility WECS regulations.

10. Upstream Energy will maintain property damage and liability insurance for any damages to persons or property that may result from Upstream's ownership and/or operation of its proposed Wind Energy Conversion System.

11. Towers #63, 64, 65 in 28-26N-6W, 66 in 33-26N-6W, 67 in 21-26N-6W, 68 and 69 in 27-26N-6W, and 77 in 23-26N-6W in the 10 mile airport approach zone shall not be constructed. Applicant may move the location of the towers outside of the airport approach zone only if the Project seeks separate authorization from the County in the form of a permit amendment for that Tower(s)/Wind Turbine(s), by following the notice requirements of Article 10 of the County's zoning regulations, as applicable.

12. A \$500.00 zoning permit shall be issued prior to construction of individual towers and meteorological towers showing that said tower(s) complies with all applicable setbacks, an acoustical analysis showing that the noise regulations can be met, and FAA approval.

13. Underground Road Permits, a Roads Agreement, and Decommissioning Plan shall be approved by the County Board before zoning permits will be issued for construction.

14. Signs shall be posted at the Right-of-Ways giving the tower numbers, address, and Owner's name.

15. All towers shall adhere to the Special Safety and Design Standards in Section 1504-06.

16. The feeder lines for Towers 71, 77, 87, 90, 127, 133, 154, 157, 160, 165, and 169 shall be supplied before a Zoning permit is issued.

17. The height of the meteorological tower(s) shall be supplied and evidence that setbacks can be met.

18. Cemeteries shall be shown on the Parcel Summary map showing that setbacks can be met.

19. Any WECS/turbine, approved in this project, not constructed and receiving a Certificate of Zoning Compliance on or before June 7th, 2019 shall be reviewed by the County Board prior to receiving a Zoning (Building) permit and beginning construction.

2nd to the Motion to adopt said Resolution

20. Upstream shall increase the tower setbacks along the public right of ways and property lines to meet the GE manufacturer's recommended setback of 1.5 x the total height. If the tower cannot meet the separation distance, Upstream shall submit and identify the tower and show that they will mitigate ice sling by shutdown.

ROAD EMPLOYEE PERFORMANCE VERIFICATION RESOLUTION 2016-06-0001

WHEREAS, Antelope County Board of Supervisors is authorized, pursuant to Neb. Rev. Statutes to perform all acts in relation to the concerns of the County necessary to exercise its corporate power, including the establishment of employee safety and wellbeing and the clarification of various compensation of employees of the County.

WHEREAS, the Antelope County Board of Supervisors has determined that it is in the best interest of the road and bridge employees of Antelope County to establish fair labor practices and ensure employee safety. All road and bridge employees will be issued a safety vest. Employees are required to wear them at all times while on duty or on the clock. Employees may purchase their own shirts/sweatshirts to wear as long as they meet the Class 2 standards.

WHEREAS, Antelope County Board of Supervisors has made recent changes to the road and bridge schedule, overtime and comp time to facilitate favorable project and work completion and times. As of April 11^{th,} 2016, the road and bridge schedule is as follows: Monday-Thursday 7:00am-5:30pm. If it is appropriate for employees to forgo lunch break, as stated in the lunch policy, employee may leave at 5:00pm. Any work done outside of these normally scheduled times must be approved by the Road Boss. This schedule may return to 5 days a week in the fall at the discretion of the Supervisors/Commissioners.

WHEREAS Comp time was discussed and approved on April 5, 2016 the following are guidelines to ensure all employee hours are correctly compensated. Comp time will be tracked through the time clock system. Comp time will be accrued at 1.5 times the amount of hours worked over 40 hours per week. When the workload is light and/or the weather is inclement, employees may be discharged from the work assignment/project and required to clock-out until work load increases or inclement weather subsides. It is the employee's option to use their accrued comp time or vacation time to recover any lost wages from the respected pay period. If none is available, the employee will go without pay for those hours. If paid work hours fall below 30 hours for three (3) consecutive weeks benefits may be compromised.

WHEREAS in the interest of employee wellbeing, paid time off is allowed. However; the Antelope County Board of Supervisors wishes to verbalize and verify the vacation leave policy as written in the employee hand book. Vacation leave can be taken as it is earned, but application for vacation time should be made 30 days in advance, if possible, and is subject to supervisory approval. It is the employees' responsibility to contact the Road Boss for approval to take vacation time. The Road Boss will contact the Clerk's Office to confirm the vacation leave.

In accordance with paragraph 4 of the County Roads Agreement, as amended by the First Amendment and Joinder to County Roads Agreement, and by the Second Amendment to County Roads Agreement (collectively the "Amended County Roads Agreement"), between Antelope County and the Developer, as defined therein, Developer has maintained and restored County roads to the as-found condition or better for the County roads identified on the attached Exhibit A. The County roads listed on Exhibit A were reviewed jointly with representatives of Developer and the County and were confirmed to meet or exceed the as-found condition. Accordingly, upon approval of this Resolution by the County Board, the responsibility for maintenance of these roads will revert to and shall become the responsibility of Antelope County, and except for the conditions stated herein, all obligations of the Developer pursuant to the Amended County Roads Agreement will terminate for County roads listed on Exhibit A. County roads which are not yet complete will continue be the responsibility of Developer until such time as they meet all requirements for the design of roads being upgraded and/or road condition meets or exceeds the as-found condition of the roads.

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, that Antelope County accepts responsibility for road maintenance as shown on the attached Exhibit A with the following conditions:

Bridges utilized for construction of the Wind Farm Facility and included in the Amended County Roads Agreement will be inspected by the County Engineer. Any damage noted and attributed to wind farm construction activities will continue to be the responsibility of the Developer.

Re-vegetation of road ditches and County right of way property remain the responsibility of Developer until such time as greater than 70% coverage is achieved with a seed mix acceptable to the County.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that except for the conditions stated above, all obligations of the Developer pursuant to the Amended County Roads Agreement are hereby terminated for County roads listed on "Exhibit A."

Sheriff Moore met with the supervisors regarding a couple issues. He first gave a shout out to Casey Dittrich, Antelope County Road Boss referring to his actions during a recent traffic incident that happened. The road crew under Casey's direction did all of the right things by placing signs, helping to control traffic, etc. and things went very smoothly. Again, Sheriff Moore reiterated the need to establish the 9-1-1 tower. The study has been completed and they are recommending a 120-foot tower. At that height on the hill it would need a light for the FAA. He has checked various bids and they range from approximately \$98,000 to \$101,601.00 to erect the tower. The low bid being Platte Valley at \$98,963.00. He reports the current tower probably holds little to no value. Mid-States may use it for an additional year, and then they would own it and they would take it down. Once the new tower is constructed, the equipment has already been purchased and will be installed by NEMA. There is not a grant available for the erection of the tower. Platte Valley Communications has been in contact with Sheriff Moore, and worked with the new tower in Boone County.

Motion was made by Williby, seconded by Bolling to adjourn. Voting aye: Williby, Bolling, Kerkman, Schindler, Henery, Koinzan and Schwager. Nays none. Motion passed.

Jacob Hurla, from 360 Engineering was on the agenda for 10:15 AM. He walked out before he was able to met with the Supervisors, and told the Clerk's office he would reschedule.

Meeting adjourned at 12:20 PM.
